

Non negotiable features:

- Lesson plan for the term must be completed in advance. Teachers to come prepared to lessons. (refer to syllabus)
- Topic and learning intention shared clearly (pupils to write topic in books with dates)
- Homework related to the current topic or next topic must be given at some point in the lesson
- Pupils must complete mid-year assessments and projects, and results to be logged on progress tracking sheet
- Use the core books as the main guide for reference, and for preparing the lessons. Other resources may be used to supplement
- Specified duas must be taught each term
- Pupils in all classes to be given a project to complete during December holidays e.g. making a board game or a model of the kaba, for example
- Class 7 and 8 to be set a research project to complete over spring holidays
